

FAI celebrated the 50th anniversary of independence with African countries

Berlin (15.12.2010) - The year 2010 marked the 50th anniversary of the independence of many African countries that are friends of the AMAN-International Foundation (FAI).

The lobbying activities carried out by the FAI for several years now have enabled the institution to build a network of personalities in Germany who have always supported the noble ideas of the Foundation and appreciated the various initiatives taken by the FAI in favor of the most deprived people in Africa.

Also, on the occasion of the activities organized by FAI, several personalities from the economic, industrial, cultural and diplomatic circles have taken the habit of honoring with their effective presence the charitable events such as the "Night of Excellence in Humanitarianism" (FAI-NEH) and many others organized by FAI in Germany.

Likewise, FAI also responds with great interest to invitations and encourages the activities of its partners of heart who listen to its initiatives. Among these partners at heart are several African countries whose diplomatic missions have welcomed with great interest the bold commitment of this African-based organization.

As ambassadors of the AMAN-International Foundation, Professor FRIDRICH, Director of the Board of Directors, and the Founding President of the FAI joined the various festivities organized in Berlin to celebrate the 50th anniversary of independence with the Heads of Mission and their collaborators of African countries who were able to start a new chapter in their history that began in 1960 and to mark their support of all positive changes towards a stable and sustainable development.

On the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary 2010, FAI officials participated in the festivities of the 17 African countries that became independent during the year 1960: Cameroon (January 1 respectively May 20 as national holiday), Senegal (April 4), Togo (April 27), Madagascar (June 26), DRC (June 30), Benin (August 1), Burkina Faso (August 5 respectively December 11 as national holiday), Ivory Coast (August 7), Chad (August 11), Gabon (August 17), Mali (September 22) and Nigeria (October 1). In addition, they participated in the national holidays of the following countries: Algeria (November 1, 1954), Ethiopia (May 28, 1991), Ghana (March 6, 1957), Equatorial Guinea (October 12, 1968), Kenya (December 12, 1963) and Morocco (July 30, 1999).
